The Harwood Museum of Art of the University of New Mexico is an internationally acclaimed museum, which serves thousands of visitors each year and has the mission of celebrating *Taos'* artistic legacy, cultivating connections through art, and inspiring a creative future.


The museum does this by conducting art historical research, stewarding a 6,500- object fine art collection, and presenting exhibitions and programs to advance the rich artistic legacy and contemporary

arts of Northern New Mexico. As the second oldest museum in New Mexico, the Harwood has been an anchor for the arts in the Taos community and continues to foster its artistic future.

Background

Art and education have been the soul of the Harwood experience since 1916, when Burt and Lucy Harwood first purchased the property at the end of historic Ledoux Street in Taos, New Mexico. In 1923, Lucy Harwood established the Harwood Foundation.

From 1929 to 1955, the Harwood served as the University of New Mexico's Art Field School. In 1935 the Harwood was gifted to the University. In 1937 the Harwood served as a WPA workshop for woodcarving and tinwork. And in 1938, a Spanish Revival style addition designed by renowned architect John Gaw Meem transformed the Harwood into a cultural center including the space. The Harwood Public Library was central to

the Taos community from 1937 to 1996. In 1997 and 2010, major renovations transformed the Harwood into the premier art museum in Taos including the addition of the world-famous Agnes Martin Gallery and subsequently the addition of the Arthur Bell Auditorium. Today the Harwood is an international destination and recognized as the leading art museum in the region. The Harwood Museum of Art library, stage, and exhibition achieved American Alliance of Museums Accreditation in 2017.

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


In 2023, the Harwood Museum of Art in Taos, New Mexico celebrates its hundred-year anniversary.

To mark the occasion, the Harwood is engaging in a multi-faceted endeavor to cement the museum's role as a steward of Southwestern history and American art. Central to this effort is the amplification of the voices of those who built and sustained this cultural institution for a century. The Harwood's Centennial celebration will take place from June 2023–January 2024, and will include: a major exhibition, a publication, a documentary, community events, and educational programming.


Retelling Our Story

The Harwood is embracing its centennial as a unique opportunity to not only showcase our permanent collection and retell the story of our institution in a new way but to take great strides to assess our exhibition and collecting practices to be more equitable and inclusive of the creative voices of our diverse community, in the past, now and into the future.

Specifically, the Centennial exhibition and publication is a high-profile opportunity to reintegrate the narratives of the Hispanic and Native American cultures of our region. This is being accomplished through extensive archival, academic, periodical, and oral history research, and is linked to our Harwood Equity and Engagement Initiative to advance key strategic goals of diversity, equity, accessibility, and

inclusion (DEIA). This more inclusive narrative will provide a foundation for defining who we are as an institution for the next 100 years and beyond.

Enhanced by the diverse voices of our Northern New Mexican community, we envision a future where our collections, exhibitions, public programs, and constituents reflect the multicultural character of Taos and New Mexico.




Sponsorship Opportunities

The overall project cost for the exhibition, publication, documentary and programming is \$447,000. Significant support is provided by the Betty Thom Foster Special Exhibitions Endowment and the Beatrice Mandelman and Louis Ribak Legacy Endowment.

To complete this project, the Harwood Museum of Art needs to raise an additional \$210,000 to fully execute the centennial.

Sponsorship Opportunities

Centennial Exhibitions

The Centennial Exhibitions will be on view from June 2023 – January 2024 and will feature over 200 works of art and 200 books from the former Harwood

Public Library. The exhibition will showcase many works from the Harwood Museum's extensive Collection as well as feature significant works loaned from other institutions, such as Georgia O'Keeffe, Elaine de Kooning and Margaret Bourke-White.

The exhibitions will fill all nine galleries (7,800 sq ft) of the Harwood Museum of Art, with the first ever comprehensive telling of the story of the Harwood over the past one hundred years. Some galleries will have multiple rotations to increase exposure of the collection. Curated by Nicole Dial-Kay, Harwood Museum of Art's Curator of Exhibitions and Collections, the

exhibitions will take the viewer on a journey of our history, including:

- 1. Land cultural history (pre-contact to 1916),
- 2. Taos' first public library and art gallery (1926–1950s),
- 3. Works Progress Administration (WPA) and Taos County Project (1937-1950s),
- 4. Mabel Dodge Luhan and the Harwood permanent collection (1917-today),
- University of New Mexico (UNM) Field School era and Taos Moderns (1929-1955),
- 6. Bob Ellis, Agnes Martin, and the creation of the modern museum (1979-2000s), and
- 7. The contemporary art colony of Taos (present).

Through each section, we will emphasize the untold diverse stories of the institution we now uphold. Rotating highlights will showcase the notable artists and arts movements represented in the collection from cultural groups representative of the New Mexican population.





The Museum of New Mexico Press will design and publish a 150- page, illustrated Centennial Publication that will highlight 100 works from the Harwood

Collection to provide an indepth understanding of the Harwood as a cultural anchor of the enduring Taos Art Colony. The publication essay will be written by Curator, Nicole Dial-Kay, with special emphasis given to the diverse voices in our list of featured artists and incorporate inclusive narratives that represent and speak to our visitors and community members.

New Mexico PBS Documentary A one-hour documentary exploring the life and legacy of Lucy and Burt Harwood will be produced by New Mexico PBS in collaboration with

the Harwood. This film will share the relatively unknown story of Lucy and Burt Harwood in Paris prior to their arrival in Taos and the creation of the Harwood Foundation. The film will be premiered at the Harwood Museum of Art and then broadcast through NM PBS channels.

Education and Public Programs The Harwood will provide a robust calendar of public programs designed to expand the stories told about the Centennial, invite existing and new audiences to engage

with the museum in fresh ways, and foster a sense of community through partnerships and programming. Some examples are:

- Outreach programming that takes the Harwood out into neighborhoods and communities across Taos County.
- Free intergenerational and community events that celebrate creativity and foster well-being.
- Lecture series or symposium with special guests who will expand on the stories told through the exhibition and highlight important eras in Harwood and Taos history.
- New curricula for teachers and K-12 students that connects the Harwood history and collections to core curriculum and state standards.
- On-site tours offered by a diverse team of Docents and community guides that

- provide unique perspectives on the collections.
- Storytelling and oral history events that celebrate untold and personal stories from our communities.
- Collaborative programming with community partners that connect and expand the possibilities of how we serve and connect with audiences across Taos County.
